The Power Women of Croatia

The power of Croatian women has transcended all former confines. They have now assumed their place in the governing of the nation and the running of the nation's commercial enterprises.

The degree to which women serve in Croatia's diplomatic service and in its government was evident in the US signing ceremony of the protocol for Croatia's admission to the NATO alliance. The ceremony took place in the Rose Room of the White House on October 24, 2008. Standing with President Bush; NATO Secretary General, Jaap de Hoop Schefer and Robert A Bradke, US Ambassador to Croatia, was Croatia's signing representative,



Kolinda Grabar Kitarović, Croatian Ambassador to the US and former Croatian Foreign Minister.

Besides Croatian Ambassador Kitarović, other women in the government of Croatia are: Deputy Prime Minister Jadranka Kosor, Minister of Family and Veterans' Affairs and Intergenerational Soli-

darity; Djurdja Adlešić, Deputy Prime Minister and President of the Croatian Social Liberal Party; Marina Matulović Droupić, Minister of Environmental Planning and Construction; Jagoda Premužić, Secretary of the Government and Vesna Pušić, President of the National Committee for monitoring negotiations with the European Union.



Matilda Mataya and Pauline Puhich – Two Remarkable Croatian Women

CroatiaFest 2009 will focus on the important role of women in the Croatian communities. Thus the opportunity to revisit the lives and activities of Matilda Mataya and Pauline Puhich, two close friends who were very influential in the greater Seattle area beginning in the late 1930's and continuing for decades thereafter.

Matilda Mataya: Matilda, maiden name Galac, was born in Žabica near Gospić in the Lika region of Croatia in 1907. In 1925 she emigrated to Merritt, British Columbia where she married Mile (Mike) Mataya later that same year. In 1929 the couple with sons Joe and Pete moved to Seattle. Daughter Mary Ann was born here in 1943.

Matilda joined Seattle Lodge 439 of the Croatian Fraternal Union (CFU) in 1936 but she was not to be just an ordinary dues-paying member. From 1939 to 1976 she served 23 terms as a lodge officer - three as treasurer and 20 as manager of the all-important Junior Order (Nest). It was as Nest Manager she made her greatest contribution. In 1939 she enrolled 155 children in the Nest and then continued her phenomenal recruiting work right on through 1969 when she earned a CFU-sponsored trip to Croatia, her beloved homeland. There are without doubt hundreds of 2nd, 3rd, and 4th generation Croatian-Americans who owe their exposure to Croatian culture and activities to Matilda Mataya.

Aside from her CFU work, Matilda always made sure the Mataya home on Beacon Hill was a center of Croatian activity - be it tambura lessons, pastry-making sessions, planning meetings, etc. Her hospitality knew no end.

Pauline Puhich: Pauline, maiden

name Bruketta, was born in Roslyn in 1905. In 1907 she travelled with her parents to the original family home in Brestova Draga near Mrkopalj in the Gorski Kotar region of Croatia. She remained there for 8 years, attended school and learned to speak Croatian so well that people always thought she had been born over there. The family returned in 1915 and in 1923 Pauline married Ivan Puhich in Cle Elum. From 1933 on, the couple and their five sons made their home in Renton.

Pauline, like her dear friend Matilda, became active in Seattle Lodge 439 of the Croatian Fraternal Union in the late 1930's and she too specialized in recruiting new members. By 1979 it was estimated that 150 or so of the lodge members had been recruited by Pauline. This work earned her a spot on the CFU tour of Croatia in 1969. Pauline was also a long-time officer in the lodge - serving 1 year as president and 27 years as a financial officer.

During and immediately after World War II, with three sons in military service, Pauline played a leading role in preparing relief supplies for the suffering people in the former Yugoslavia. Also, after the war she was instrumental in founding Puhich Dry Cleaners in downtown Renton and worked there for 30 years.

Like the Mataya household, the Puhich home was one of endless hospitality. Pauline always had a big pot simmering on the stove waiting for the arrival of one or more of her sons and their friends. No one, including this writer, ever left hungry.

In their twilight years, after decades of working at Croatian picnics, dances, children's parties, etc., Matilda and Pauline wound down some and became known as



the "Sunshine Ladies". Although beset with ailments of their own (particularly Pauline) they took it upon themselves to regularly visit elderly, shut-in Croatians in the greater Seattle area. They worked as a team until Pauline's death in 1983. Thereafter Matilda continued on as the single "Sunshine Lady" until she could no longer drive. She passed away in 1999.

Prior to the leadership that Matilda Mataya and Pauline Puhich exerted in the late 1930's, social activity in Seattle's Croatian community was largely the realm of men. From that point on, however, and continuing to this day, women have been equally involved in every aspect of Croatian life in our community.

A tip of the hat then to Matilda Mataya and Pauline Puhich as CroatiaFest 2009 acknowledges the contributions of our stalwart Croatian women.



Croatian Women – Their Journey to America

“That’s the picture I fell in love with!” These were the words of an elderly Croatian widow we were visiting one day years ago in Seattle. She was pointing to a picture sitting on her mantle—a picture of her late husband, a Croatian immigrant she married in the 1920’s. After exchanging pictures, she traveled to America and then, after knowing each other a few short weeks, they were married.

This was a story repeated many times over and over in America. This is how many Croatian women came here after the first World War. Most of these “picture bride” marriages were arranged by families and many times the prospective couples were from the same village or the same area in Croatia. Most of the Croatian immigrants were un-married when they came to America. For example: we know from a State of Washington Governor’s report that in 1914, during the strike at the Tacoma/Ruston smelter, there were 264 Croatian smelter workers and only 17 of them were married.

The gates to America were wide open to all immigrants from Europe prior to the outbreak of the First World War, but after the end of the war, immigration was restricted and much more difficult. Yet, immigrants who were already here could bring a prospective bride or extended family members.

Typically, a young Croatian man would come to America, join fam-

ily members here, start working, save money, gradually learn English and start getting established. After a period of years, most of them wanted to settle down and marry a Croatian girl – thus, the arranged marriages. Some went back to Croatia to find a bride or marry a sweetheart who had been waiting for him. After the wedding, this brave couple would travel, by ship, back to America, and start a new life together.

How did other Croatian women come to America? Certainly, some came as married couples and some couples already had small children. Usually, the men went to work while the wives stayed home and cared for the family. There were also many immigrants who were married in Croatia but came here without their wives and after a period time, some as long as ten years, would then bring their wife to America. During this early period, it was very rare for a single young Croatian girl to arrive in America unspoken for. She was certainly sought-after by Croatian men who wanted to marry a girl from “the Old Country”.

Very few immigrants during that period could speak English when they arrived and had to learn on their own. Because of this, the men of the house often learned English much earlier than their wives because of their exposure to the “work world”. Most women eventually learned to speak English, and those of us who grew up with immigrant parents know what it’s like to grow up in a home hear-

ing broken English. When we were teen-agers, their broken English may have embarrassed us, but as we became mature adults, their broken accents became endearing to us. My father immigrated to America from Croatia in 1910 at the very young age of 14.

Croatian immigrants of the late 1800’s first settled in the Eastern part of America, much earlier than the West Coast. Thus, most Croatian Americans in the East are third and fourth generation; whereas, many of us here in the West are first and second generation Croatian offspring born in America.

Most of these original immigrants are gone now, even the younger “picture brides” who came here prior to the 30’s. No matter how these Croatian women came to America, they brought with them and passed on to us the many skills, traditions and culture of that land – the cooking, the sewing and needlework, the music, the songs and dances, and the Croatian language of which we as children learned in the home because this is the language that was spoken. We also learned from them the virtue of hard work.

The CroatiaFest 2009 theme of the festival is: “Croatian Women – Tradition Bearers”, and will explore in detail the many traditions and skills passed on to us from these women. Come hear more stories like this one and see and experience this tribute to Croatian women!

Seattle Junior Tamburitizans 2009 Croatia Tour

The 2008–2009 season marks another milestone for the Seattle Junior Tamburitizans as they embark on their 5th tour of Croatia and plan ahead for the group's 40th Anniversary in 2010.

For as long as anyone can remember, there have been tamburitza orchestras and bands in Seattle and surrounding communities. As early as the 1920's tamburitza musicians under the direction of the late Andrew Skrivanich played for picnics, dances weddings and lodge gatherings. Later the Sušanji and Cvitković families had orchestras and in the 1960's Tacoma had its own Junior Tamburitizans. Seattle in the 1950's however, really got a tamburitza "shot in the arm" when Tom and Louie Krmpotich moved here from Minnesota's Iron Range. The brothers started a group called *Jadran* and in 1970, Tom, along with Richard Major, founded the Seattle Junior Tamburitizans.

AUCTION - MAY 9

On May 9th the Seattle Junior Tamburitizans parent's club will host the second annual Tamburitizans' Benefit Auction which will be held at the Renton Senior Center. This year the auction committee has planned a sumptuous meal and will offer hundreds of fun and interesting auction items from weekend getaways, gourmet Croatian catered dinners, artwork, sports memorabilia and much more. KAVANA - JUNE 20

Shortly after the group's inception in 1970, a parent's club was organized in order to raise funds to purchase tamburitza instruments and costumes, cover hall rentals and day to day operational costs of running a group. The

late Millie Jurgich Medin, a SJT Mom, envisioned an evening of music, song and dance modeled after the "Balkan Kafanas" or "coffee houses" where one could dine on ethnic foods and enjoy an evening of entertainment. KAVANA has been an annual event ever since, where the SJT's showcase the folk songs and dances they have been perfecting all season long. This year's KAVANA will be held Saturday, June 20 at John F. Kennedy High School.

CROATIA TOUR 2009

Just a week after Kavana, the Tamburitizans will depart for a two week performing tour of Croatia. The group will fly to Zagreb and will visit the beautiful sights of Croatia, performing along the way. Each of the Tamburitizans will have the opportunity to perform in the towns and villages of their ancestors and will meet (some for the first time) cousins, aunts and uncles.

What is even more exciting is that the youngsters will be performing dances and music specific to the regions from where the families came. It has been the goal of the SJT artistic staff to teach material from the areas where Puget Sound Croatians hail. Over the last 10 or so years, that has included the Islands of Susak and Dugi Otok, Delnice in the Gorski Kotar Region and a wedding celebration of Ogulin. This year's program consists of dances from the Neretva River Valley, Podravina and Baranja. The Tamburitizans will bring a little Americana to Croatia with the Tamburitza Boogie, made popular in the 1950's! We look forward to this historic year in our group's history and invite you to be a part of it!
